### New MIA Chairman

## Future housebuilding on the up?

While government announcements appear to suggest a firmer future for new housebuilding in the UK, a recent statistical report indicates a slowing trend.



In the UK government's 2019 spring statement, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Philip Hammond, announced a guarantee of up to £3 billion of borrowing by housing associations in England to support construction of 30,000 new homes through the Affordable House Guarantee Scheme.

He also announced that £717 million from the Housing Infrastructure Fund will be used to 'unlock' up to 37,000 new homes in four identified areas. These are Old Oak Common in west London, Didcot in Oxfordshire, Cambridge and Cheshire.

In making the announcements, Mr Hammond said this would put the UK on track to raise housing supply to its highest level since 1970 by the end of the current Parliament (2022) and to reach 300,000 new homes a year by the mid-2020s, compared to the current figure of 220,000.

However, NHBC figures to the end of February 2019 show a 7% decrease in new housing registrations compared to the same month in 2018. This year 7,550 were registered in the private sector (9,080 in 2018), with 3,171 in the affordable sector (2,495 in 2018).

For the rolling quarter, between December and February, 34,199 new homes were registered compared to 34,723 a year ago – a decrease of 2%. During this period there were 23,105 new homes registered in the private sector (26,562 in 2017/18: -13%) and 11,094 in the affordable sector (8,161 in 2017/18: +36%).

NHBC chief executive, Steve Wood, said: 'Continuing the trend from January we are seeing strong numbers in the affordable sector but an understandable drop in the private sector amid the ongoing Brexit uncertainty.'

MIA manager, Mick Russell, said: 'Continued high use of factory-produced mortar suggests house building in the UK remains strong but we do need government to ensure general infrastructure development takes place including funding for essential elements such as schools and doctors surgeries to meet future needs.'

# Hugh King & Co becomes part of Tillicoultry Quarries



On 26 October 2018 Hugh King & Co became part of Tillicoultry Quarries Ltd, bringing with it a whole range of new products and services.

Hugh King was established in 1853 and operated from a small yard in Irvine harbour in Ayrshire as a coal and sand merchant. Throughout the late 20th century it supplied Scottish foundries with moulding sand and the local glass works with sand for the manufacture of green bottles. It moved to its current site in Kilwinning in 1979, taking over the valuable silica sand deposits at Hullerhill and allowing the expansion of the business into new and emerging markets.

With the on-site availability of a sand drying plant from the traditional foundry industry,

the company was well placed to venture into the expanding dry silo mortar and render market. With the availability of white silica sand from Hullerhill and brown sands from the quarries at Newhill and Garnock, the company is able to produce an extensive range of coloured renders and mortars for the UK house building and construction market giving Hugh King a unique versatility within the market. Now supported by the wider Tillicoultry Group, the whole construction package of concrete, asphalt, mortar and render can now be offered.

In addition to silo-based products, Hugh King manufactures a wide range of bagged renders and mortars for general building use and specialist adhesive and repair mixes for stone and tile bonding and concrete repair markets. These are packaged through an automated filling system on to a robotic stacker and transferred on to rack storage for onward distribution across the UK.

The name of Hugh King is to be retained but a subtle rebranding of the silos to incorporate some of the features of the Tillicoultry Quarries logo is giving a fresh, invigorated look to company. Other than that it is business as usual!

### Guild of Bricklayers skills competition – MIA continues sponsorship

MIA is again sponsoring the Guild of Bricklayers annual skills competition for industry trainees.
